Introduction

Many years ago we began the difficult but very interesting task of searching for the Roots and the History of the Hallahan Family.

At that time most of the family elders and friends who had this information we were seeking had long since passed on. Not getting any younger ourselves, we felt there should be some form of family record to pass on to our children, grandchildren and to those who are to come in the future generations.

To date the task is far from complete. Many parts of the puzzle are missing. I am sure there are some we will never find. Some facts that we believe are true have been passed down from family to family and we are unable to confirm completely. Dates will vary from birth certificates and official death records. Census records were difficult to find, very inaccurate at times and often incomplete. Many settlers could neither read or write. The census takers would many times write down what he thought he heard by the sound and the names were often misspelled.

It has been a slow process. Hundreds of letters have been written, documents searched, gravesites visited, and etc. With the help of many of you who have sent us bits of information or told us where to look, we can now say we have enough statistics to make a fairly good record of our beloved clan.

The Hallahan name is not a common name in the United States. At this time (1989) there are listed only 430 families in the entire Country. Most likely we are all related indirectly in some form or other. All from the "old Sod".

A. Brief History of the Hallahan Family

After years of search we have confirmed that Michael B. Hallahan is our great grandfather. Our records show he was born in Co. Cork, possibly in the area of (Dunmanway), Ireland in 1827. No indication of day or month has been found.

It has only been since 1864 that the official registration and recording of the Irish families in Ireland has taken place. Data before this time has been difficult to obtain. At this time we have a registered genealogist working there hoping to find our Irish roots. One listing he has found that is interesting and may be one of our kinsman is a Cornelious Hallahan, death listed in 1873 at the age of 88 and is from the same area that our great grandfather came from. It would be exciting to discover the names of Michael's family before he came to America.

Michael left Ireland at the age of 19, sailing on the Ottawa, May 12, 1846 from Liverpool, England to New York. The Ottawa was a large ship often picked up emigrants from small shuttles, coasties, or ferries along the Irish coast. Cork is a long way from Liverpool, therefore, a larger ship probably brought them around through St. George's channel and the Irish Sea. It was over a month at sea before they would arrive in New York. Most were required to furnish everything they would need on the journey including their own food. They cooked their food on the deck and often slept there. It was a difficult time for many on the trip.

From the date of his arrival in New York we have very little information as to his activities. Most were bits of hearsay and stories passed down for several generations. Michael worked as a laborer in New York.

In the early 1850's he met and married Mary Kelleher (no records of the marriage have been found to date.) They were married in a Catholic Church somewhere in New York City. Mary was working as a domestic for a wealthy family at the time of their marriage.

Mary Kelleher was born in the year 1829 (again no complete date was given.) It was listed on her tombstone as being born on the night of the big storm. Mary was born in the town of Toorenglarahei, parish of Nohaval Daly, Kanturk, Co. Kerry. She had told relatives she left Ireland at the height of the potato famine with her family aboard the ship Columbus. They took a small sailing ship, the Nimrod, out of Queenstown to meet the Columbus. Leaving Liverpool, England on Sept. 7th and arriving in New York October 22, 1849. An interesting item we ran across; we found that the Kellehers are a Dalcassian family, in Irish the name Kelleher is spelled O' Ceileachair, i.e. descendants of the famous Irish King Brian Boru. Their original habitat was in Co. Clare. In the 14th century they migrated to Co's Cork and Kerry.

After their marriage Michael found a job as a laborer building railroads westward through Pennsylvania. Much of this information came from Lila Lee and her grandmother. Lila Lee said the Irish practically single handed built the railroads across the country. Her grandmother told her that after railroading they traveled west into Ohio in a covered wagon. Here they settled and began raising their family. Six children were born in Ohio. During those years of the 50's and early 1860's we have very little information. We are still searching for the 1860 census that would have them listed. It would be during the civil war and would certainly be an interesting time.

Our first real break came when we located the family in the 1870 Census. The family had pulled up stakes and moved to Indiana. They settled in Clinton County, Johnson Township, with post office located at Mortonville, Indiana. Here they had purchased a farm and had five more children. More copy was recorded on the census. Michael was listed as a farmer with real estate valued at \$1000.00 and his personal estate valued at \$600.00. In those days right after the Civil War this was considered as a fair estate. It was also interesting to note that they were registered as citizens of the United States and that neither could read or write. Their last child was born June 10, 1877, a son James.

What ever happened after 1877 we have no record or information regarding Michael Hallahan Sr. We assume that he died in those years before 1880. No one in the families seemed to remember him. They all talked about grandma Mary but never mentioned their grandpa Michael. We are still trying to find some burial records, deeds for the sale or transfer of their farm property. My father couldn't remember his name. It is one of those blank spaces that I hope we will be able to fill.

In the 1880 Census Mary had moved her family to Bowling Green, Pettis County, Missouri. Michael B. was not listed on the census roll. Mary was listed as a widow with her son John H., her oldest son age 19, listed as head of the household. A son Michael Jr. and a daughter Ellen had died in the period from 1870 and 1880.

In the records of the 1900 Census Mary Hallahan was living in Cooper County, Clear Creek Township. Her age was listed as 70 (month and day were requested but not given.) Mother of 11 Children, 9 alive on June 1, 1900. Widow, owns home. Son James born June 6, 1874 (birth dates not the same), at home, laborer.

We have enjoyed putting this information together and hope that before our time passes we can find out where and what happened to Michael B. It's a shame that we didn't start this search many years ago. Our parents didn't know the answers and our grand parents were very vague. I have often had the feeling that some of the missing pieces of our history might have been planned. Maybe there were things they didn't want us to know. All my life our clan referred to each other as stubborn Irish Hallahan's.

Maybe so but what a story we could tell if we could see what happened in their lives between the years 1827 and 1800.

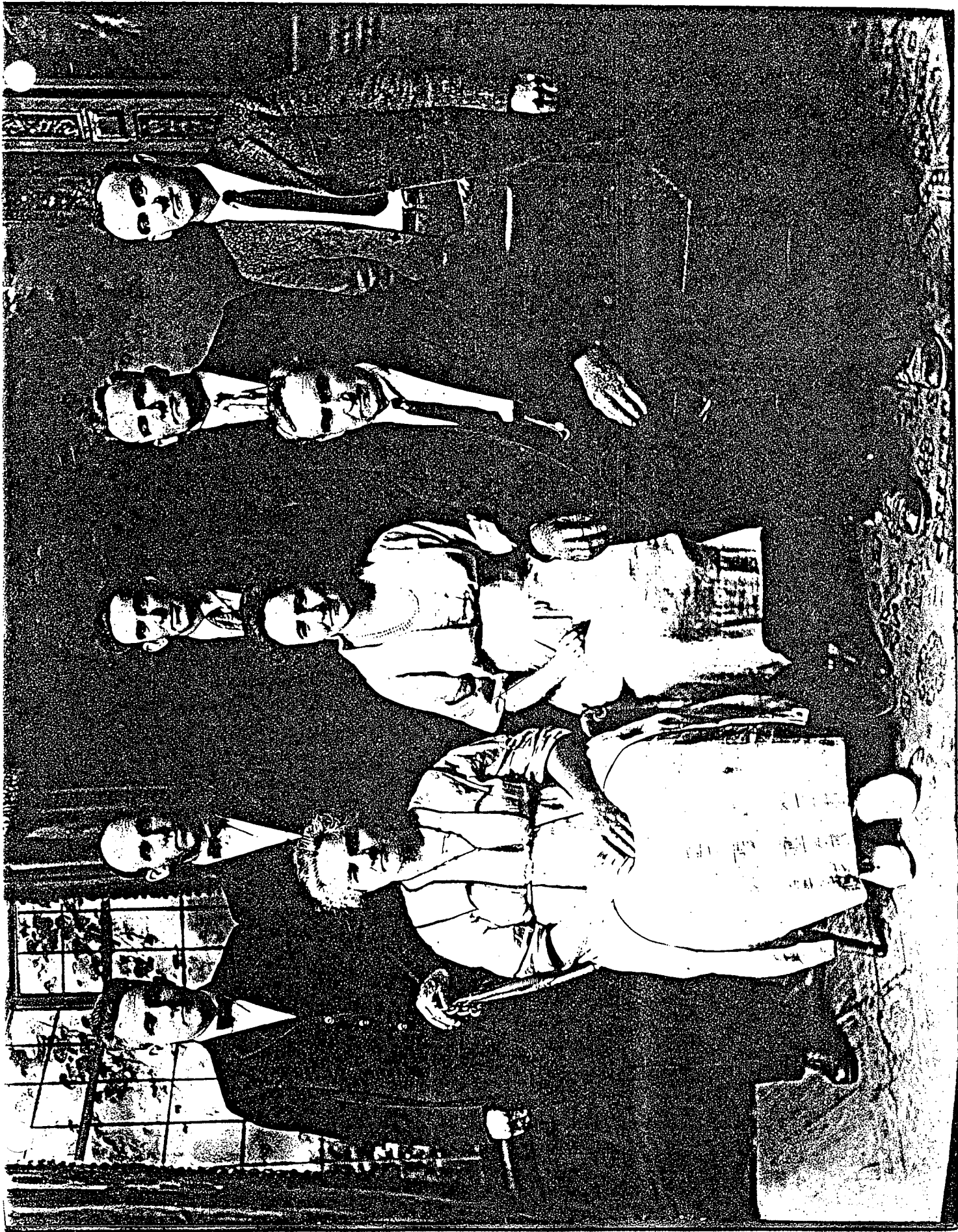

HALLAHAN GENEALOGY

(1) March 11, 1988

Emigrants From Ireland 1847-1852, pages 52-53: 64-67. Records of the Kelleher family aboard the Columbus, which left Liverpool on 7, Sept. and arrived in New York 22, Oct. 1849.

The Manifest listed: (This is an out going list, not the passage lost.)

(2) The Famine Emigrants Vol. 5, pages 9-11. We found the original list on film to support the (T.F.E.'s) transcript. The Manifest below shows 8, Oct. 1849 as the arrival time in New York.

The customs men, the captain of the ship and others probably drank a bottle the day they completed the list. Then too, they wrote from sound, not from spelling.

It appears that old Daniel Sr. died aboard the vessel, or did not sail. Or the custom officers in New York errored in their records thinking the had but one Daniel aboard. Then again maybe it was another "wee sip" from the bottle again. It was a known common practice in those days.

(4) Michael Hallahan already listed as dead. Obviously the census taker erred in making Kate and all the children listed below her as children of John. John was listed as head of the household. Mary was not listed as his mother.

We searched Indiana, U.S. Census for the family in Howard County, City of Kokomo but did not find a trace of them. It is important to find the father Michael Hallahan and get his age. We know that he was living at home, at least until 1875. From the facts known, he died in Indiana, ran off?, or did he move with the family to Missouri and die there before the 1880 Census?

Note the name Jeremiah (indicating his correct name.) Jeremiah is a very common given name in Cork County. In 1900 Mary's age is given as 70, year 1830 as year of birth. In 1880, 45, gives year 1835. No one ever saw her month, day or year of her birth. Registered civil birth and deaths began in Indiana in 1880 but we hope to find more information in the U.S. 1860 and 1870 Census lists soon. The 1890 records were all destroyed.

(6) It is too bad we can't find the listing of their marriage. New York is notorious as to their records. They have no records of civil marriages until 1880. There are some New York records recorded as early as 1866 but unless we have more data the costs would be prohibitive to search. In the U.S. and Ireland there is still no central repository for Catholic Church records. Most churches simply do not answer when we wrote for information.

(7) Hit pay dirt, enclosed is the family of Michael Hallahan which is definately yours. The print enclosed will demonstrate the poor quality or the hard copy, enhanced by second or third generation microfilm printing.

This all we have to date. Apparently they were in Indiana only from about the end of the civil war. Ohio will be the next project. We will start going through the counties one by one. There still should be some records or deeds in Clinton Co, Ind. When the widow left for Missouri there should be some type of sign off papers. Maybe a will? Our greatest "optimistic idea" that he would have named his parents, brothers, sisters, or the location of the old home place in Ireland.

(9) June 9, 1989

Have covered Fayette Co., Ohio. U.S Census 1860. No location of name, even a similarity. Found in Jeffersonville, Ohio 1860 a Michael Hallahan, age 25 laborer, Ireland. But had a wife name Bridget. Not our man. Found another in Steubenville, Ohio also not ours. We thought at first he might be because it was near Cedar Point. One of the death records of John Henry Hallahan listed being born in Cedarville, Ohio. The names sounded similar. We checked Cedarville carefully. None listed at all. Very few Irish born folks there.

(10) June 13, 1989

Letter May 23, 1989 from Joan C. Bohm, genealogist from Frankfort, Clinton Co. Indiana Records. Found no will or estate file for Michael Hallahan through the years 1854 to 1873. From this it is possible that Michael went to Missouri with the family and died there.

The age gives 1827 birth in Ireland fitting the 1870 Census of our ancestor Michael Hallahan perfectly. Have not looked at the microfilm of the list yet. Will continue to look.

Working with Data from Ireland. Have surveyed records after 1864. Too late for our Michael but looking for members of his family at that time. Have found some interesting prospects but must sort out the information carefully.

KINGWILLIAMSTOWN

The crown estate of Kingwilliamstown was situated in the parish of Nohaval Daly, barony of Duhallow, near Kanturk and the Cork-Kerry border, in Co. Cork. The decision to promote a state-aided emigration scheme for the estate was taken by the Commissioners of Woods some time after 11 April 1849, when a report from Richard Griffith recommended such a scheme for the removal of the 'surplus population'.¹ The crown agent on the estate, Michael Boyan, who also had charge of the model farm experiment at Kingwilliamstown, was instructed to prepare lists of those who would emigrate willingly, or whose compulsory removal was necessary for the 'improvements' on the estate.

A Treasury warrant of 6 August 1849 authorised the expenditure of £1,500 for removing 238 persons, 158 adults and 80 children, from Kingwilliamstown to New York, at an estimated cost of £6. 15s. for each adult and £5. 3s. for each child. A first instalment of £800 was sent to Boyan, with instructions to proceed with the implementation of the scheme.²

The first party, consisting of 119 persons, left Kingwilliamstown for Cork on 30 August 1849. They sailed for Liverpool aboard the 'Nimrod', and embarked for New York on 7 September 1849. Kennelly and Company, of 23 Maylor Street, Cork, agents of the Liverpool firm of Harnden and Company, had charge of the travel arrangements. The fare for an adult was three pounds and for a child, two pounds five shillings. Food or 'sea stores' was provided, and each adult was to receive one pound and each child ten shillings in American currency on landing in New York.³

Complaints by some of the Kingwilliamstown emigrants, that sufficient food was not forthcoming on the journey from Cork, were investigated by Boyan on instructions from the Commissioners of Woods. He reported that the scarcity of food was caused by the refusal of the captain of the 'Nimrod' to delay departure while supplies were being loaded.⁴ Three persons died at sea between

Cork and Liverpool and two sisters were sent home, so that only 114 persons sailed from Liverpool.⁵ The total cost of this movement of emigrants was £498. 3s. 6d.⁶

In February, 1850 a letter was delivered to the Office of Woods, having been sent from America by John Galivan or Galvin, who complained that neither he nor his family had received any provisions while in Liverpool or during the voyage to America. Reports from the emigration officer at Liverpool insisted that all the travellers had adequate supplies of food.⁷

Nevertheless, when arrangements for the departure of the second group of emigrants were being made, a copy of the tender from the shipping agents was sent by the Commissioners of Woods to the Emigration Commissioners⁸ for their opinion on the amount of food to be allocated to each individual for the voyage. The fare in this instance was four pounds for an adult, three pounds ten shillings for a child under fourteen, and a pound for an infant under one year. According to the tender the food to be supplied to each adult was as follows:—

3 quarts of water daily,
2½ lbs bread or biscuit weekly,
2 lbs rice
1 " wheat flour
3 " oatmeal
½ " sugar
½ " molasses
2 ozs tea

Children under fourteen would receive half of the above quantities.⁹

In their report, the Emigration Commissioners suggested that, in order to comply with the requirements of the Passengers' Act 1849,¹⁰ that the allowance of oatmeal be raised to five lbs weekly per person. The shipping agents should be responsible for maintaining the party in Liverpool should any delay occur before sailing.¹¹

The all-in cost for a child was £4 16. 0. On the acceptance of the amended tender, thirty-six persons left Cork for Liverpool on 15 June 1850, and arrived at New York shortly before 29 July 1950.¹²

Several of this group settled in Buffalo.

A third party of seventeen left Cork on 5 October 1850.¹³ The cost of the emigration of this and the second party was £313 8s. 7d.¹⁴

Arrangements for the departure of the fourth and last organised party of nineteen were sanctioned by the Commissioners on 10 September 1851 and they sailed from Cork for Liverpool on 20 September.¹⁵ Expenses amounted to £92. 19s. 3d.¹⁶

Thus in the three years, 1849-50-51, a total of 191 persons left Kingwilliamstown at a cost of £904. 1s. 4d., almost £600 less than the amount originally allocated for the scheme.

The population of the crown estate of Kingwilliamstown, which was returned as 656, (344 males and 312 females) in the crown agent's report of 16 May 1849, had declined to 479 persons by 24 November 1852.¹⁷ Accordingly, a scheme to send a further 100 persons to America was proposed,¹⁸ but nothing appears to have been done and the last reference to such schemes concerns the eldest daughter of Daniel Sullivan who had been caretaker of the estate. Six pounds was advanced for her fare to America on 25 April 1855.¹⁹

The crown estate of more than 5000 acres which was referred to

as the 'mountain pasture of Pobble O'Keefe' in older surveys, was sold by auction in five lots in April 1855 for a total sum of £14,520.²⁰ The village which has grown on part of the estate has within the last few years been renamed Ballydesmond.

I mean to Come in to New York and there Spend the winter Thade Houlehan wrote to me Saying that if I wished to go up the Country that he would send me money but I declined so doing untill you Come and then after you Coming if you thing it may be Better for us to Remain here or go west it will be for you to judge but untill then I will Remain here Dan Keliher Tells me that you Knew more of the House Carpentry than he did himself and he can earn from twelve to fourteen Shilling a day that is seven Shilling British and he also Tells me that Florence will do very well and that Michl can get a place Right off as you will not be In the Second day when you can Bind him to any Trade you wish And as for John he will Be Very Shortly able to Be Bound two So that I have Every Reason to Believe that we will all do well Together So as that I am sure its not for Slavery I want you to Come here no its for affording My Brothers and Sisters And I an opportunity of Showing our Kindness and Gratitude and Coming on your Seniour days that we would be placed in that possision that you my Dr. Father and Mother could walk about Lesuirly and Independently without Requiring your Labour an object which I am Sure will not fail even by Myself if I was obliged to do it without the assistance of Brother or Sister for my Dr. Father and Mother I am proud and happy to Be away from where the County Charges man or the poor Rates man or any other Rates man would have the Satisfaction of once Inpounding my cow or any other article of mine Oh how happy I feel and am sure to have look as The Lord had not it destined for [hole in paper probably obliterating 'me'] to get

married to Some Loammun or another at home that after a few months he and I may be an Incumbrance upon you or perhaps in the poor house by this, So my Dr. Father according as I had Stated to you I hope that whilst you are at home I hope that you will give my Sister Mary that privilege of Injoying herself Innocently on any occasion that She pleases so far as I have said Innocently and as for my Dr. Ellen I am in Raptures of joy when I think of one day Seeing her and you all at the dock in New York and if I do not have a good Bottle of Brandy for you Awaiting your arrival its a Causion.

Well I have only to tell My Dr. Mother to Bring all her bed Close and also to bring the Kittle and an oven and have handles to them and do not forget the Smoothing Irons and Beware when you are on board to Bring some good floor and Ingage with the Captain Cook and he will do it Better for you for very little and also Bring some whiskey and give them the Cook and Some Sailors that you may think would do you any good to give them a Glass once in a time and it may be no harm

And Dr. Father when you are Coming here if you Possibly can Bring My Uncle Con I would Be glad that you would and I am sure he would be of the greatest acquisition to you on board and also Tell Mary Keefe that if her Child died that I will pay her passage very Shortly and when you are Coming do not be frightened Take Courage and be Determined and bold in your Undertaking as the first two or three days will be the worst to you and mind whatever happens on board Keep your own temper do not speak angry to any or hasty the Mildest Man has the best chance on board So you make your way with every one and further you are to speak to Mr. Boyan and he I am sure will get one Request for you Mr. Boyan will [l]d[o] it for me, when you are to Come ask Mr. Boyan [to g] ive you a few lines to the Agent or Berth Master of the Ship that will Secure to you the Second Cabin which I am sure Mr. Boyan will do and as soon as you Receive this letter write to me and let me know about every thing when you are to come and what time and state Particulars of evry thing to me and Direct as before. And if you are to come Shortly when you come to Liverpool wright to me also and let me know when you are to sail and the name of the Ship you sail in as I will be uneasy untill I get an answer

No more at present But that you will give Mr. and Mrs Boyan my best love and respect And let me know how they and family are as they would or will not Be ever Better than I would wish them to be
